Course Requirements and Expectations

Attendance/Participation: You will receive 5 points for each class attended, for a total of 100 points possible (20 class meetings).

Readings and Q&Qs:: You are to post on canvas by NOON the day *prior* to class discussion meeting (so that would be each Tuesday, since we meet Mon/Weds and Weds are reading discussion days) a response to the lecture/readings in the written form of **one quote** and **one question** (Q & Q). This will be used to generate the responses and discussions of the material as needed.

It is important to note the difference between *responding to* and *reacting to* something you have read or heard – especially the theories and concepts you will be learning about in this course.

• Responding = opening up and receiving the impressions and communications of the subject and/or work – an *inquiry* mindset that raises questions

• Reacting = resisting seeing what is there; reactions can interfere with communication because reactions tend to come from our own personal or cultural biases and prejudices (ex: saying a person *should have* acted/thought in a certain way is reacting rather than responding)

The Exam: as discussed in class, The Exam will be a traditional test on the readings, terms and lectures (some stuff will come from me actually lecturing and not from a reading!). It will consist of a mixture of shortanswer essay, fill-in-the-blank and multiple choice.

Final Creative Project (check-ins included): Your final project will be approved by the professor, but is open to just about any form of in-depth, cumulative response to what you have learned about applied theatre through this course. You will complete a draft IPAD (see attached) for Check In #1 and a revised draft for Check-In #2 and the completed version of the IPAD will accompany your final project, whether it be a submission or activity or ... TBD! DUE!
